*****IMPORTANT INFORMATION*****

When registering a vehicle, the **law** requires that the registrant show proof of insurance. Your insurance card must show the correct VIN and a *beginning* and *ending* date for the insurance coverage, which must include the day you are registering. When registering a "new" vehicle, you must have the **Monroney Label** (window sticker). Car dealers should include with your paperwork this label, a **blue** application for title, and a sales agreement showing Maine sales tax paid. Please bring all these forms to the town office when registering. This does **not** apply to private sales, which require an original title and bill of sale. Remember, you must **always** start at your Town Office when registering a motor vehicle. We will collect excise tax and send you to the BMV in Augusta if we are unable to complete the transaction. If you are re-registering with no changes, you can do this online through our website.

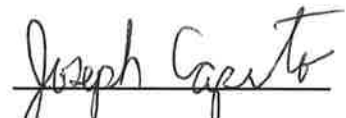

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine, and I welcome this opportunity to update you on the work that has taken place in the Senate over the past year. My staff and I have addressed numerous issues affecting our state, and I would like to share some of the progress that we have made.

Since my *Social Security Fairness Act* was signed into law in January 2025, the law has been fully implemented and restored earned retirement benefits to 2.8 million Americans. More than 25,000 Mainers have seen their monthly benefits increase and have been issued more than \$184.5 million in retroactive payments. I am proud that this legislation has improved the lives of many retired firefighters, teachers, police officers, and other public employees and their spouses.

I was honored to become the first Maine Senator in nearly a century to lead the Appropriations Committee. Since I took this role last January, Congress enacted full-year appropriations bills before December for the first time since 2018. These bipartisan bills included full-year funding for Military Construction and the Department of Veterans Affairs, the US Department of Agriculture, and the Food and Drug Administration. At my request, these bills included nearly \$35 million in Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) for local projects across Maine that will improve fire stations and emergency services, update municipal buildings, and support upgraded facilities at the Maine National Guard and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard (PNSY) in Kittery. This funding builds on the nearly \$1.1 billion in CDS I have secured since 2021 for worthy projects that benefit local communities and nonprofits across our state's 16 counties. As Chair, I remain committed to working to better ensure that federal spending and investments produce real results for the people of Maine.

I have also led other important legislative efforts this year that address problems many Mainers face. This includes bills that expand federal efforts to combat Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses and improve access to early testing for Alzheimer's disease. Provisions I authored to strengthen prevention, treatment, and recovery services for those struggling with substance use disorders and mental illness were included in the *SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Reauthorization Act* that was recently signed into law. An amendment I authored in this year's *National Defense Authorization Act* will increase apprenticeship opportunities at public shipyards like PNSY. That bill also includes more than \$400 million to support critical infrastructure improvements at PNSY and a well-deserved 3.8 percent pay raise for all our nation's service members.

In addition to advancing legislation, I worked to ensure that federal commitments to Maine were maintained and, when necessary, restored. I secured a seasonal employee exemption for Acadia National Park from the Administration's federal hiring freeze and from closure during the recent government shutdown. I protected local programs like Maine Sea Grant and global initiatives like the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) from harmful funding cuts. I led the effort to resume enrollment at Maine Job Corps centers and fought for full funding for Maine's public schools this school year. I preserved funding for the University of Maine System and secured the restoration of funding to the Passamaquoddy Tribe at Pleasant Point and the Penobscot Nation. I protected low-income Mainers' access to key programs like LIHEAP and SNAP. Although I voted against the *One Big Beautiful Bill Act* due to my opposition to Medicaid cuts, I helped secure \$50 billion to support rural health providers through the legislation's Rural Health Transformation Program. Maine has been awarded \$190 million in the first year of this five-year grant program.

Throughout my Senate service, I have never missed a roll-call vote and have cast more than 9,850 consecutive votes—reflecting the Maine work ethic I bring to Washington. My continued ranking as most bipartisan Senator from the Lugar Center and Georgetown University is a testament to Maine's tradition of working with cooperation and respect.

We will always provide regional assets to our communities including a K-9 Teams, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy and Accident Reconstruction.

As in previous years our Law Enforcement Deputies logged thousands of calls for service.

One call for service continues to decrease and that service is overdoses of prescribed medications or illicit substances. I personally believe the increase in treatment options, both locally and nationally, has had an impact on overdose deaths. This Sheriff's Office will always support our citizens with substance dependency disorders by providing avenues that can assist with their recovery.

In 2025 our patrol division welcomed Deputy Chad Webster, Deputy Tyler Johnson, Deputy Max Sawyer and Deputy Nicholas Gage to our team. Currently 3 out of the four mentioned individuals are fully certified law enforcement officers.

In 2025 the Sheriff's Office continued our School Resource Officer duties for MSAD #11 in Gardiner, MSAD #49 Albion, Benton, Clinton and Fairfield and RSU#38 at Maranacook. We have had requests from other communities for a School Resource Officer and should we be able to get to full staff, we will try and fulfill these requests.

In 2025 Detective Devin Polizzotti received eight weeks of specialized training, downloading digital information off phones, laptops and desktops, assisting with retrieving evidence for criminal cases. Our detective is one of only about 15 people in the state with the ability to do this. Our agency also received over \$70,000.00 in specialized hardware at no cost.

We had two retirements in 2025. Staff Sergeant Frank Hatch retired and then rehired as our Patrol Commander. K-9 Vixen, who has served our communities with great distinction and tenacity for several years, is now living the dream of relaxation with her handler Deputy Jeff Boudreau. Her amazing ability to locate people, drugs and other articles associated with crimes, is noteworthy. Maybe Deputy Beaudreau had a little bit to do with it as well.

Deputy Beaudreau reached out to a couple nonprofits and was able to secure monies to purchase not one but two new K-9s, saving the hard-working taxpayers of this county thousands of dollars. Deputy Boudreau's new partner is Rooster, a male Dutch Shepherd and the other is Rico, a Belgian Malinois teamed up with Deputy Curtis as his handler.

Our Civil Process Deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local, and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2025, the three civil deputies received over 5,130 requests for service in Kennebec County. This has been an increase by over 500 services from 2024. Some of the services include civil summons & complaints, foreclosures, evictions, small claims, child support notices from the State and enforcement of court orders and writs to name a few.

During the past year, our Correctional Facility had 1984 inmate intakes into the facility. The offenses committed by those in our care included everything from Trespass to Homicide. Substance abuse and the proper treatment of inmates with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. Kennebec and all other county jails are mandated by state law to provide these services. On a side note, our correctional facility received a 100% compliance during our Department of Corrections inspection. A job well done by all!

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. One may think that this only benefits the County, or our local municipalities, but it does not. It also benefits the inmate population as well. They are very hard workers, and they make a difference. Thank you to programs inmate supervisor John Matthews, for his dedication to his job.

I again would like to thank all my staff in administration, patrol division, detective division, correctional division and the civil deputies. About 112 of them in total, for their dedicated service to our county.

As your Sheriff, and moving forward into 2026, my focus will remain constant and focused, serving the people of this county and our visitors honorably, professionally through good common sense and good judgement law enforcement.

Treasurer and Tax Collector's Report, Fiscal Year 2025-26

The Town's 2025-26 financial "year" included many changes, including an 18-month fiscal year (FY) transition, the completion of a major culvert replacement on Blodgett Road, the purchase of a new fire rescue truck, and the addition of a new deputy treasurer/tax collector. It was a significant year with many improvements to our processes, services, and infrastructure.

The extended fiscal year in 2025-26 meant that the tax bills included a one-time, third payment. This extra payment on the bill was necessary to cover the first six months of 2026, which were in addition to our normal year. Starting on July 1, 2026, the Town's FY will span July to June, with tax payments due on October 31 and April 30 annually. This new schedule allows for regular payments every six months, rather than requiring two payments at the end of each calendar year. And during the transition and beyond, no more than two payments are required in any calendar year.

From the perspective of the Town's finances, a primary benefit of the change in fiscal year is observed in our ability to manage "cashflow." Previously, our fiscal year began in January, with lots of monies going out before the major inflow of revenue (through property tax) in September. This cycle required a large starting balance at the beginning of the fiscal year in order to avoid running out of operating funds in August. With the new FY dates, tax revenues come earlier in the budget and tax periods, thereby reducing the amount of "carryover" funds required to start the year. As a direct result of this change, this year's town warrant (if passed as written) will utilize \$352,000 of previously unspent monies (i.e. "surplus") from the General Fund to reduce the tax requirement at commitment.

Looking forward on financial topics, I anticipate the adoption of a Fund Balance Policy, which would set a minimum balance for cashflow planning and guide decisions regarding how much of the undesignated funds may be used. Additionally, the Town has a number of properties that may be considered for sale in order to return them to revenue generation. Lastly, the Town may consider a formalized and detailed capital investment plan for major expenses related to roads, fire vehicles, and building infrastructure. Each of these measures would further improve the Town's fiduciary foundation.

I wish all of you a great summer and I hope to see you at Town Meeting!

**APPEALS BOARD
2025 ANNUAL REPORT**

Dear Residents,

The Board of Appeals is a quasi-judicial body authorized by state law and town ordinances to hear appeals from decisions made by the Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) and the Planning Board. *“The appeals board must decide legal questions in accordance with local ordinances, State laws, and court cases. Often those decisions will seem harsh and contrary to “common sense,” both to board members and to the general public. This is particularly true when the board is asked to decide a request for a variance. However, the board is bound to follow the law until the law is changed.”* - MMA Manual for Local Land Use Appeals Board

The Appeals Board is required to meet just once each year, after the annual Town Meeting, to elect a chair and secretary. Otherwise, the Board does not meet until an appeal application is filed by a citizen disputing a decision made by the Planning Board or the Code Enforcement Officer. Years may pass without a single appeal being filed.

Summary of the actions of the appeals board in 2025.

- Appeals Board elected a new chair: Terry Marks elected chair of the board
- Appeal #1 of 1 for calendar year 2025: Request for a variance to road frontage on Wiscasset road. Status: Granted. (The appeal met the criteria of "undue hardship").
- Appeals Board elected new chair: Due to Former chair moving from town, John Andrus was elected chair of the board

If you would like to become more involved with Pittston’s Municipal Government, but wouldn’t like to commit to frequent, regular meetings, the Appeals Board may be for you. The Board includes up to 5 regular and 2 associate members – and there are typically a few openings. Contact the Select Board at selectboardadmin@pittstonmaine.org with your interest.

Report of the Codes Enforcement Officer January to December 2025

Dear Citizens of Pittston,

It has been a very busy year! Building has continued strong in Pittston despite the economy being a bit unpredictable. In 2025 I answered 989 calls for service in town.

The Town hosted an intern for the summer to learn about Codes Enforcement and how local government works. We were very fortunate to have Alex Emery as our intern. He went on many site visits with me and began the project to scan all of the property files and upload the documents into our Real Estate database. Alex managed to scan all the documents for maps R01 to R08, almost 6,000 documents! Sue Look, the Deputy Town Clerk, is continuing the project and is correcting any mis-filings which have accumulated over the years. All scanned documents will be saved in the town software by map and lot number.

There have been several ongoing investigations of code violations, some of which have required working with State agencies, especially the Maine Department of Environmental Protection and the Maine Department of Health and Human Services.

The Land Use Ordinance is being updated due to the many new law changes as it relates to building. The specific bills are LD2003 from the 130th Session which speaks to affordability, density and accessory dwellings; and LD1829 from the 132nd Session which establishes a Housing Development Resolution Board to hear appeals of final decisions by municipalities regarding housing development. Currently, LD2173 is being considered by the State Legislature and may change LD1829. I have been working with the Ordinance Review Committee, who has been working on incorporating the law changes for approximately one year. The updated Land Use Ordinance will be presented to the Town this year for a vote.

I would like to remind the citizens that all permit applications need to be filled out completely before I can issue the permit. Not doing so will delay when you can begin your project. Also, please bear in mind that I am CEO for 5 municipalities and may not be immediately available when you call, but will make every attempt to get back to you within 24 hours.

Pittston Fire Department Annual Report – 2026



We wrapped up another solid year serving Pittston with no major injuries or incidents. We responded to roughly 120 calls and approximately 60 hours of company-level training, keeping our skills sharp and response dependable.

Staffing is lighter than preferred, but our crew steps up, trains hard, and covers what's needed. We're grateful for strong mutual aid partnerships, especially with Gardiner Fire Department. When the tones drop, we operate as one team to ensure fast, professional service.

Fire prevention remains a highlight. Our annual program at Pittston–Randolph Consolidated School was a success, reminding us why this work matters.

With the new truck entering service, we'll focus on driver training, pump operations, and wildland refreshers so every member is confident behind the wheel and pump panel. We train hard because the town deserves a crew that knows their equipment inside and out.

ORDINANCE REVIEW COMMITTEE

2025 ANNUAL REPORT

In 2025, the Ordinance Review Committee was tasked with creating the framework and content for a new Land Use Ordinance. The purpose of the new Ordinance is to comply with changes to Maine State land use law, support the implementation of the 1998 Comprehensive Plan of the Town of Pittston, as well as to consolidate and clarify multiple Pittston land use regulations into a single Ordinance.

The Maine Department of Economic Development has responded to the national housing shortage by developing the Housing Opportunity Program, and the Maine Legislature has written laws to implement this Program. The Maine Constitution requires towns to follow Maine law first, then, provided there is no conflict with law, utilize home rule authority to govern municipal operations. These new laws are a profound reduction in municipal home rule authority.

On June 20, 2025, the Governor signed LD 1829, “An Act to Build Housing for Maine Families and Attract Workers to Maine Businesses by Amending the Laws Governing Housing Density.” As with predecessor legislation known as “LD 2003,” this legislation seeks to create conditions to increase housing density within the state by reducing regulatory obstacles and creating a more favorable environment for developers. Many of the provisions within the new land use laws are designed specifically for large communities with public water and septic services – as Pittston is without public water and septic services most of the provisions do not apply to our Town. However, significant provisions of the law do apply to Pittston and supersede home rule by:

1. Mandating that, with limited exceptions, Pittston permit at least three dwelling units on any lot located in a residential area. The law further requires that four dwelling units be permitted on any residential lot that is also located within a growth area,* and;
2. Reducing the minimum 2 acre lot size requirements for land within growth areas.*

Compliance with LD 2003, LD 1829, and Title 30-A, M.R.S. §4364, Affordable housing density, is not optional – it is mandatory. For Pittston to be out of compliance with these laws creates significant legal risk. While complying with new land use law is imperative, protecting Pittston’s home rule authority, where otherwise not prohibited, continues to be a priority of the Committee. This new Land Use Ordinance meets Maine law to the extent required and sets home rule authority clearly when permissible.

**Good news for Pittston Recycling! Maine's Packaging Stewardship Program (EPR) is rolling out to help offset recycling costs.**

Passed in 2021 and updated in 2025, the **Product Stewardship for Packaging Law** requires producers (brand owners and companies that put packaging on products sold in Maine) to help fund the management of their packaging waste. The goal is simple and practical: reduce wasteful or hard-to-recycle packaging, support local recycling efforts, keep our communities cleaner, and ease the burden on local taxpayers.

**How it works in plain English:** Companies pay into a statewide system based on the type and amount of packaging they use. That funding helps reimburse Maine municipalities for the cost of managing packaging waste, while also investing in better recycling infrastructure and public education. Reimbursements are expected to begin around 2027, based on 2026 cost data.

**What does a town need to do to qualify and get reimbursed?** Participation is completely **voluntary**—no town is forced to join. To be eligible as a “participating municipality,” a town must meet just **two core requirements**:

1. **Provide access for the collection and recycling of one or more** of the materials designated as “readily recyclable” on the state’s Packaging Material Types List (Appendix A in the rules).
2. **Submit an annual report to the stewardship organization** with recycling tonnage and cost information (the state and stewardship organization will provide forms and guidance).

This setup rewards efficient local recycling without punishing smaller or rural communities. Towns can even report jointly with neighbors or regional partners.

The program is still ramping up in 2026, with the stewardship organization is in the process of being selected. Municipalities interested in participating should start tracking eligible recycling costs now (labor, hauling, equipment, education, etc.) and can email [MainePackagingEPR@maine.gov](mailto:MainePackagingEPR@maine.gov) to express interest.

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In Pittston this year, 5 boxes of batteries (200 pounds) were shipped to a battery collection facility to keep harmful chemicals out of our soil and water. We switched to a new battery process due to Fedex shipping regulations.

In 2025, money was requested to pour a concrete pad under the collection bins to prevent corrosion and make hauling easier. This improvement was voted down in Town Meeting.

Recycling center staffing has been improved by creating a list of backup helpers when the Attendant is not available. If you would be able to occasionally cover the shift, for pay, please contact the Town Office, 207.582.4438 for more information.

We are a small group of volunteers who try to assist Town staff by calling attention to the benefits of recycling. The current group has been at it for over 20 years! We welcome input from residents who have an interest in helping the Town and saving the planet. Over the past few years, we have been asked about a Swap Shop, electronics recycling, spring and fall roadside clean-up and the Free lawn sale. You are welcome to help us plan these events.

We are counting on residents to follow the rules for recycling. Please DO NOT leave non-recyclable material at the center. Over the past year we have had furniture, electronics, unopened canned goods, broken tools and other trash left for us to clean up, at Pittston taxpayer expense.

At this time, only #2 plastics are allowed. This is not our rule but a requirement from plastic recycling companies. If there is a certain percentage of other types of plastic then the entire load is rejected which defeats the good intentions of the majority.

Please empty and rinse glass jars, otherwise the attendant must sort through them to remove half full jars of salsa. Do not recycle glass jar lids, they have other materials in them.

For tin cans, rinse and, if you can, crush them or nest them together to save space. Please include only common household batteries, smaller tool rechargeable batteries and small electronics batteries. Larger commercial batteries can usually be recycled at Lowe's or Home Depot.

Newspaper, magazines, box board (like cereal or butter packages) and office paper all go in the mixed paper bin. Only corrugated (wavy core) cardboard should go in the cardboard bin. Boxes must be flattened to fit through the bin doors.

More information about recycling can be found at <https://www.ecomaine.org/what-can-be-recycled/recyclopedia/>. This guide covers all of Maine, including some municipal systems that accept all plastics and some other items that Pittston does not. All plastics can currently be taken to Hatch Hill, but only #2 in the Pittston bin. Please talk to your neighbors about the long-term value of recycling. It is greatly appreciated by your recycling team.

Dear Citizens of Pittston,

The RiverWalk Committee (RWC) is happy to report that in 2025 real progress was made toward making the Town's land between Old Cedar Grove Road and the Kennebec River into a public recreation area suitable to hiking, picnicking, and escaping by enjoying the outdoors locally. In the RiverWalk's case that outdoors was already naturally charming, but as many Pittstonians can recall, it was once a busy gravel pit that left behind lots of old tires, scrap metal, and other debris. Huge efforts by RWC volunteers have extracted most of the remnants of the gravel operation from the underbrush, and now they are working on getting it hauled off for sale or recycling.

Besides the clean-up operation, the RWC volunteers have made RiverWalk much more accessible by adding the first of two new parking lots. It is at the upper entrance to the site on Old Cedar Grove Road and marked with a sign that is really of national park-level quality and stature. Leading away from the new lot is a rustic former road—foot traffic only—leading down to the river. Improving this road is a top priority of the RWC and will happen soon.

Perhaps the RWC's biggest effort this last year has been applying for a grant from the Maine Trails Program (MTP). Alas, we did not get the grant, but it was favorably received by the MTP people, who encouraged us to reapply this year. Of course, the RWC was disappointed by not succeeding on the first round, but included in the silver lining of the effort was commissioning a landscape architect who has created a master plan, getting the site vetted and okayed by the various environmental protection agencies, and focusing RWC on a central mission: creating a new trail that is fully ADA accessible.

In closing, the RWC wants to reassure Pittston residents that it is abiding by their wish to bring the town a riverside recreation area without using additional tax monies. Of course, getting the MTP grant would greatly help us in our mission, but, regardless, abundant volunteerism will continue to move us forward in 2026.

Dear Pittston Residents,

Kennebec Land Trust (KLT) is pleased to share news of our conservation work with Pittston residents and the Select Board.

In Pittston, KLT permanently protects the 50-acre Eastern River Preserve, located off Blodgett Road. The property features more than 4,100 feet of frontage on the Eastern River, an extensive oxbow, and 1,800 feet of frontage on tidal Otter Creek. Kennebec Land Trust The preserve protects important wildlife habitat for wood ducks, common mergansers, mallards, and great blue herons, and offers a short trail with scenic river views and a hand-carry paddling access point. Kennebec Land Trust It is open to the public free of charge, year-round.

KLT works cooperatively with landowners and communities across central Maine to conserve forests, lakes, streams, wetlands, fields, and wildlife — now permanently protecting more than 8,200 acres and maintaining over 61 miles of trails. In 2025, KLT continued advancing the Howard Hill universally accessible trail project in Augusta and Hallowell, accepted new conservation properties, and hosted a full calendar of public programs including guided hikes, paddling outings, and a Lyceum lecture series on Maine reptiles and amphibians.

Independent Auditors' Report

OPINIONS

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Town of Pittston, Maine, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town of Pittston, Maine's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

BASIS FOR OPINIONS

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town of Pittston, Maine, and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Town of Pittston, Maine's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

REQUIRED SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis, schedule of changes in net OPEB liability and related ratios, and budgetary comparison schedule, on pages 5-9, 27, and 28 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Pittston, Maine's basic financial statements. The schedule of departmental operations is presented for purpose of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and related directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedule of departmental operations is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

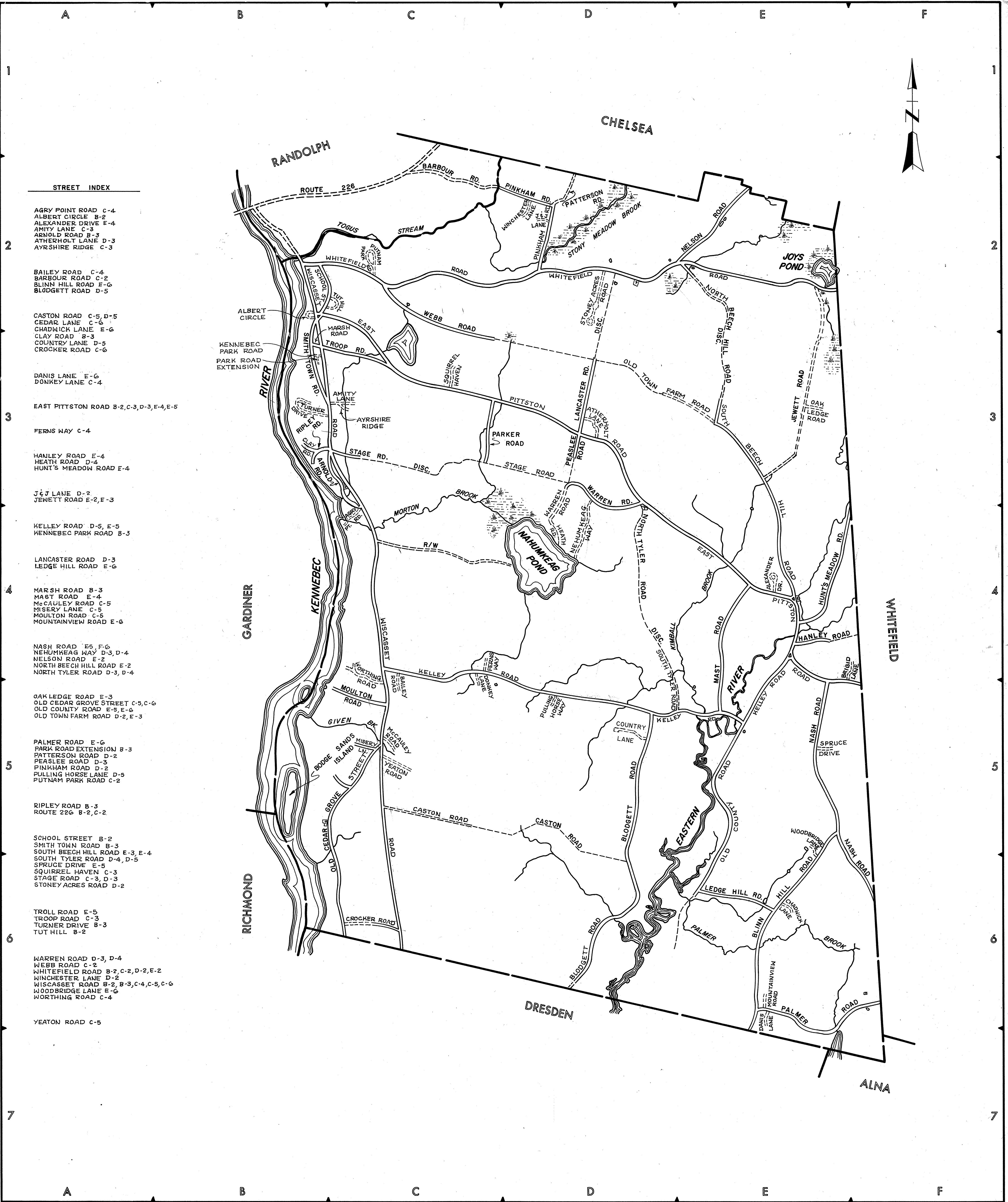
